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About Cwmbran Community Council

Cwmbran Community Council serves the community of Cwmbran in the south-eastern corner of Wales. Within Torfaen, it occupies the valleys and hills along the Afan Llwyd river.

Cwmbran was created as a New Town in 1949, when its existing villages were developed into a cohesive and vibrant community.

Today, Cwmbran is essentially urban in character but with areas of rural and unspoilt charm. There are around 30,000 electors in Cwmbran.

Cwmbran Community Council is one of the largest Community (town) Councils in Wales. It provides grass roots services to all parts of a diverse and growing community.

The Council's strategic direction is set by elected Councillors (Members) who oversee a team of staff responsible for delivering services on a day-to-day basis.

Statement from the Chair 2024/25

I have enjoyed enormously being Chair of Cwmbran Community Council over the past year. It has been a joy and an honour to represent this forward-thinking and community-minded council. The past year has been a testament to what can be achieved when passion meets purpose, and I am incredibly proud of the progress we've made together.

In 2024/25, we built on our legacy by investing in a range of community projects that have had meaningful impacts. We allocated funding to enhance our local parks and green spaces, including new seating areas and upgraded play equipment that now provide safer and more inclusive environments for children and families. We also supported the introduction of community-led gardening schemes that have brightened up neighbourhoods and promoted sustainability.

Our commitment to supporting local groups remained unwavering. We continued to provide financial and logistical support to long-standing partners such as CCYP (Cwmbran Centre for Young People), whose vital work helps empower the next generation, and the Congress Theatre, which continues to be a cornerstone of local arts and culture. In addition, we awarded grants to newer community organisations and initiatives, helping them grow and thrive—from mental health support groups to cultural associations celebrating Cwmbran's diversity.

The Council's own events programme has grown stronger and more inclusive than ever. From heritage celebrations to environmental clean-up days, we have brought people together in the true spirit of community. Events like Crowfest, where I proudly wore my Hawaiian shirt and glitter beard, drew huge crowds and showcased the creative heartbeat of our town. Our engagement in causes such as the Pontnewydd Park protest—yes, even in a giant inflatable dog costume—highlighted our commitment to playful but powerful local activism.

I've had the honour of representing this council in a wide range of settings, from formal events like flag-raising ceremonies to the more festive or quirky community gatherings that make Cwmbran so vibrant. Regardless of the outfit—be it a suit, glitter, or costume—each appearance reflected our core mission: to be present, involved, and proactive in our community.

Thank you, the residents of Cwmbran for entrusting us, working together, to achieve the real differences we are making in people's lives. It is the way we balance advocacy for our individual wards with a collective vision for the greater good of Cwmbran that makes this council so unique.

Together, we have shown what a local council can achieve when it leads with heart and purpose. Let's continue building on this strong foundation.

Financial Information

The Council derives most of its funds from its precept. That is an amount which is added to Council Tax bills to fund the Council's estimated expenditure. For the financial year 2025/26 the Council estimated that it needed to spend £898,945.00

Cwmbran Community Council set its Precept for 2025/26 at £692,771.57 a 7.5% increase on the 2024/25 precept.

The Council retains its funds in a number of institutions:

Unity Trust Bank: on 31 March 2025 the balance on this account was £101,880.14

Monmouthshire Building Society: on 31 March 2025 the balance on this account was £1,216,752.44.

Co-operative Bank: on 31 March 2025 the balance on this account was £40,533.17

Income and expenditure for 2024/25 will be recorded in the Annual Return, which is to be approved by 30 June 2025. Details will be available from the Clerk.

The certified-annual-return for 2024/25 will be published and will include financial information for the year ended 31 March 2025.

General and Earmarked Reserves are identified in the Council's Statements of Accounts produced at year end. These will be available from the Clerk.

This Report covers the financial year 2024/2025. The Report was approved by Cwmbran Community Council on 18th June 2025

Events and Celebrations

The Council arranged a vibrant series of exciting events each year to engage and stimulated the community.

Cwmbran Big Event

The Cwmbran big event was taken on by the Council in 2019 when Torfaen Borough Council were no longer able to support it. It is the biggest event we organise and last year we welcomed approximately 10,000 visitors. The event is funded by Cwmbran Community Council. We also receive vital funding contributions for the event from Croesyceiliog & Llanyrafon Community Council.

Crowfest

A new event for Cwmbran @75, a one day music festival at Cwmbran Stadium, that was held in July 2024, to such positive feedback that we are doing it again this year!

Schools Eco Quiz

This fun quiz tests the knowledge of local primary school children and encourages the understanding of sustainability, climate change and biodiversity. The quiz takes place every year in February and is partially funded by Knauf Insulation.

Primary and Senior Schools Festival

The primary school festival takes place in March with the Senior schools talent showcase being moved to March also. The event has been running for almost as long as Cwmbran Community Council has existed and is still a popular event.

Remembrance Day

The Council has been a longstanding supporter of the community's commemorations of events associated with Remembrance. Working with CADESA (Cwmbran and District Ex-Services Association) Standing shoulder to shoulder with families who have lost loved ones and community leaders.

Christmas

We round off our programme of events with a delightful series of tree lighting ceremonies in the heart of our community with some exciting, planned changes to come.

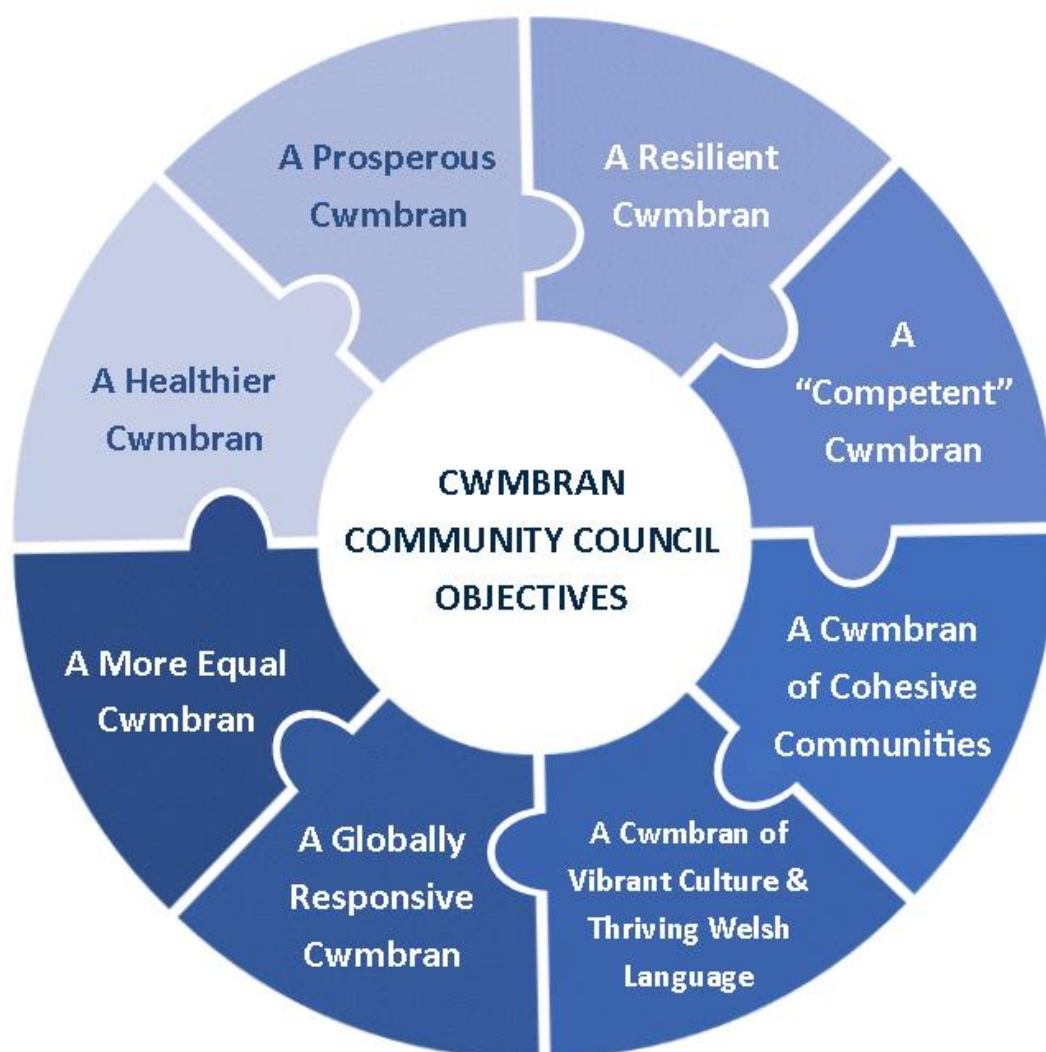

Our Work

Here are some figures and reflections which indicate our success this year.

In 2024 – 2025 Cwmbran Community Council spent £75,549.39 on grants benefiting 57 individual groups or projects throughout the community.

Grants to Voluntary Organisations 18 organisations supported across sports, community activity, arts, culture and more!

Total Funds Awarded £57,532.21

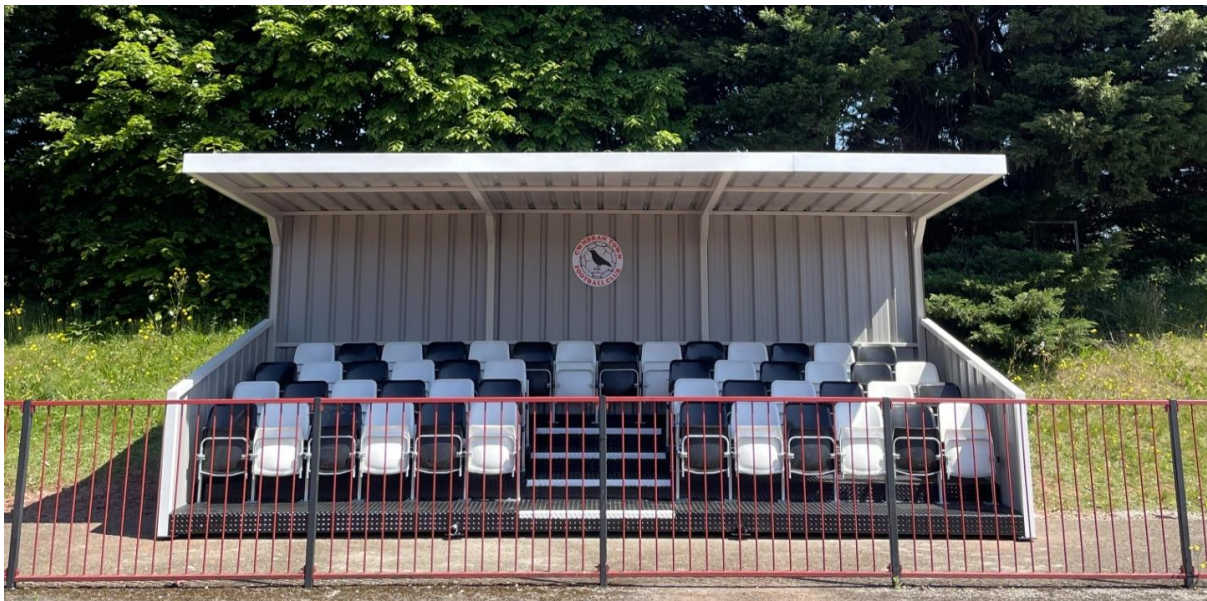
Members Small Schemes 39 organisations supported, member small schemes allow members to identify organisations within their wards for small amounts of funding and to contribute to organisations that serve residents across Cwmbran

Total Funds Awarded £18,017.18

The Council also spent £30,000 on regeneration projects in 3 grants of £10,000 each which has helped to lever in additional funds in excess of £250,000.

The grants went to Cwmbran Celtic AFC for floodlights at their ground to enable more use at the pitch. To Cwmbran Town FC for a new stand at Cwmbran Stadium this will help towards their promotion and to enabling comfortable seating for the first time since the main stand at the stadium was closed.

And finally, to Able for Solar Panels at their base in Upper Cwmbran to make the venue more sustainable and to reduce energy costs.

2024/25 Ward Update: The last year has been a busy time for the Northville ward. With the UK Government, Welsh Government, Torfaen Council, Cwmbran Community Council and the Private Sector all making massive investments into the ward.

The completion of the new school building at Maendy Primary, as part of the Twenty First Century Schools programme, is a shining example of what can be achieved with collaborative work. And with their new senior leadership team in place, the school is well equipped to help shape our next generations

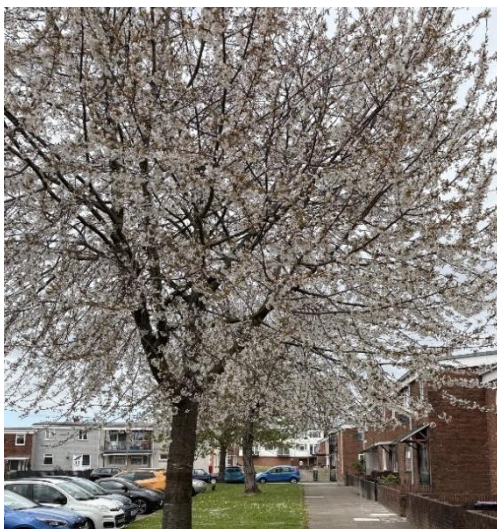
The new facilities at Cwmbran Train Station represent a real coup for members of the Community Council as the new accessible lift and bridge is a project that local members have been campaigning for for the better part of a decade, and with the works at the station completed it leaves both the ward and the town in better and fairer place to bring future investment to our area.

And on the theme of investment, the show of confidence that the private sector has shown in the Northville Ward is astronomical. With the new stagecoach depot acting as transport hub for the entirety of south east wales and the new Lidl supermarket opening in the ward, they firmly cemented Cwmbran's place as the premier retail and work destination of South Wales.

Working in the community members have helped with issues around litter and bins, speeding, parks, and have worked with partners to deliver grant funding for local organisations, evening and holiday activities for our young people and have even funded the mural adorning the new school. Members have also worked with Gwent Police and other bodies over issues of public concern and have taken steps to address anti-social behaviour and local nuisance areas.

There's been a lot to be proud of in Northville over the last 12 months, and going forward we look forward to hearing your ideas on how we can improve where we live.

Coed Eva Ward Annual Update- Cllr Rhiannon Bennett

It's been a busy and inspiring year in Coed Eva, and I'm proud to share some of the highlights.

Community and Civic Life

This year, I was honoured to be elected as **Vice Chair of Cwmbran Community Council**, giving me the opportunity to support and celebrate the brilliant work happening across our community.

I represented the Council at a Memorial Dedication Ceremony with Croesyceiliog & Llanyrafon Community Council, and during the Cwmbran Remembrance Parade, where I laid a wreath on behalf of our council. I was also invited to give a reading at St Gabriel's Church, where Reverend Nick Perry praised the council's civic presence. These moments remind us just how important it is to honour the past and stand together as a community.

A real highlight of the year was joining the Gurkha Dashain Celebrations, a joyful day of community, food, and dance. The warmth of the welcome and the strength of community spirit was unforgettable.

We also continued our support for the Torfaen Play Service Christmas Card Competition, with over 500 fantastic entries. A big well done to winner Freya Lawton, who received an arts pack to encourage her creativity to flourish

Wellbeing Warriors: Big Change from Small Beginnings

What started as a simple parent-and-child wellbeing initiative at Coed Eva Primary has blossomed into something truly powerful and I'm proud to have helped fund this work through my Members' Small Schemes funding pot.

In partnership with Andrea Jones of Happy Kids, a series of workshops helped families build emotional resilience, better communication, and stronger relationships. Parents who were feeling isolated found connection. Children found their voices. And together, they built a foundation of confidence and kindness.

Out of this, a new idea was born: 'The Wellbeing Warriors', a pupil-led group supporting emotional wellbeing across the school. These young role models wear bright tabards so they can be easily spotted in the playground. They listen, offer friendship, and remind their peers that mental health matters every day.

With buddy benches planned to be installed and a focus on the *Five Ways to Wellbeing*, they're making emotional support a visible and everyday part of school life.

Expanding the Impact: Cwmbran High School

Inspired by the success at Coed Eva, I helped fund a similar project at Cwmbran High School, again working with Happy Kids. These workshops give teenagers a safe space to explore stress, confidence, and social pressures, while also equipping parents with tools to better support their children.

The result? Stronger families, more open conversations, and a culture of care growing through every corridor. It's not just about one-off sessions, it's about creating lasting change, empowering young people, and building a supportive school community from the ground up.

I'm now welcoming applications for the 2025/26 Members' Small Schemes fund. If you're part of a school, group, or local organisation and have a project that could make a difference in our community, I'd love to hear from you.

Grow the Magic: Living Christmas Tree Scheme

Cwmbran Community Council is bringing more Living Christmas Trees to Cwmbran, and thanks to The White Hut Committee, Coed Eva is getting involved!

The idea is simple: plant real trees in community spaces, decorate them together each year, and create new traditions that grow over time. Cwmbran Community Council will provide the tree, solar lights, training and support, all we ask is for local help to care for the tree and host a community lighting celebration.

This is about joy, connection, and making memories together for children now and future generations.

Nature on Your Doorstep: New Woodland Trail

Celebrating a Local Hero: Julie Stratford

This year's Health and Wellbeing Champion Award went to Julie Stratford, a truly inspiring local resident.

Julie founded the first neurodivergent support group in Cwmbran, creating a safe, welcoming space for people to share experiences, build strategies, and support one another. Her group meets at the community room in Asda, Cwmbran, and it's already having a big impact.

Julie is a shining example of community spirit and a true local champion.

Wards Update - Fairwater, Greenmeadow and Ty Canol

Councillors from Fairwater, Greenmeadow & Ty Canol come together to put on a Pantomime for the children & families of the community; by working in partnership with Cwmbran High, we were able to use the main hall, allowing as many children and families to come together to enjoy the experience which took place in February 2025. This was a great success with over 250 people attending.

By working in partnership with CoStar, a hanging basket project was developed, allowing community members to collect free hanging baskets and decorate them to display outside their homes, brightening up the community.

Lowlands and Avondale Ward Update, Cllrs C Morgan & S Morgan

During the past year we have supported many of the community groups and activities that have taken place in our ward. Here are a few of the highlights.

Litter-picking.

We have worked with Fiends of Pontnewydd Park in our regular Tuesday evening Talk and Tidy sessions, doing pooh hunts and regular litter picking. We held a “NO POOH IN OUR PARK!” protest which was attended by around 30 people, including our own Shep character.

With the Bridge 46 to Five locks group, we have done path clearance and litter picking and acted as stewards for their Christmas and Easter Bunny flotillas.

Together with a community group we did a major clear-up of the Chapel St. surgery car park in preparation for re-marking of the bays and the redevelopment of the car park itself.

Councillor Ward Surgeries

We hold regular surgeries at Mount Pleasant Hall on the first Friday of every month where any ward resident is welcome to come and chat and let us know the issues they are facing. We support by following up with relevant council and housing officers and frequently have our PCSO police and Bron Afon housing colleagues with us to talk directly with you.

Small Schemes Financial Support

Each councillor has a £1000 fund to support local groups. In the past year we had given to Mount Pleasant Community Hall, local food banks, Friends of Pontnewydd Park, Bridge 46 to 5 Lock canal group, Pontnewydd Football Club and part funding the new memorial bench near the cenotaph.

Community Events

During the year, we have supported events, such as Picnic in the Park and the lighting of the memory tree “Hold them close at Christmas” in Pontnewydd Park; the celebration of VE Day/ play park reopening in Brooklands; the Christmas tree lighting on the village green;

Serving Our Community: 2024–2025 Review

Keeping Our Area Clean and Safe

Taking pride in our environment and ensuring it provides a safe, clean space for residents to live and enjoy is very important. We have;

- **Community Rubbish Skips:**
...provided access to skips for residents to safely dispose of large or bulky items, reducing fly tipping.
- **Litter Picking Hub:**
...established a hub for equipment loans, encouraging local groups and individuals to join in keeping our streets clean.
- **Regular Litter Picking Sessions:**
...have organised sessions across the area, bringing together councillors, residents, and volunteers.
- **Tackling Nuisance Fly Tipping:**
...continued to work closely with residents and enforcement partners to address persistent fly tipping hotspots, resulting in visible improvements.
- **Partnerships with Police, Fire, and Community Teams:**
...have strengthened local partnerships to tackle anti-social behaviour, improve community safety, and deliver a joined-up response.

Bringing the Community Together

Community is our number one passion. We live and work in the area so ensuring its success is personal for us. Establishing a strong sense of togetherness and identity is key to resilience and success. As Councillors we have embedded ourselves at the heart of the Community as volunteers, Trustees, Committee members and Governors where we can best serve our residents. With this in mind we have...

- **Community Bus Trips:**
...subsidised and organised affordable and accessible trips, helping combat isolation and providing enjoyable experiences for all ages.
- **Celebration Events:**
...hosted well-attended Christmas, Easter, and Halloween events, creating memorable moments for local families.
- **Summer Fayre & Christmas Panto:**
...worked in partnership with local businesses and groups to deliver popular, high-quality, low cost community events, bringing joy and boosting local engagement.
- **Arts Council Wales Partnership:**
...brought nationally recognised shows to the heart of the community, raising the cultural offer in our area and ensuring that local residents are not excluded from accessing the arts.

Supporting Vulnerable Residents

We are aware of the struggle that some of our residents face daily and work to ensure there is always a safety net. As Councillors we;

- **Weekly Foodbank:**
...manage the food bank at Thornhill Community Centre we have provided essential support to households experiencing hardship, ensuring no one goes hungry.
- **Emergency Food Parcels (Torfaen-wide):**
...have partnered with local organisations to respond swiftly to urgent food needs across the county.
- **Emergency Fuel Support:**
...have partnered with a national charity to help residents across Torfaen on prepay meters avoid disconnection during times of fuel poverty.
- **Christmas Food Hampers:**
... have collaborated with schools, Cwmbran Community Council, and partner agencies to distribute festive food hampers to households who might otherwise go without.

Sustainability and Regeneration

By working with TCBC to secure SPF funding we were able to realise the following upgrades to Thornhill Community Centre which ensure it maintains its place as a sustainable community hub for years to come:

- Installed solar PV panels to cut carbon and energy costs.
- Created the *Cwtch*, a dedicated safe space for Wellbeing and Support services.
- Built a new Food Bank facility to improve provision.
- Established a Community Shop to increase access to affordable goods.
- Refurbished the lounge area, transforming it into a bright, welcoming community meeting space.

Supporting Local Organisations

We have supported applications for funding from organisations in the ward to make improvements and upgrades or to continue their charitable work.

- **Grant Support to Able Radio:**
As Community Councillors we have spoken in favour of and supported grant investment which helped secure funding for solar PV installation, reducing costs and improving sustainability.
- **Supporting HopeGB's Relocation:**
We recognised the vital support that HopeGB offers to many families and worked to ensure they remained within our community. Including Partnership work with Bron Afon to ensure HopeGB could set up a new kitchen and establish themselves in a fresh location.

New Provisions for All Ages

We have heard your message from our surgeries and chats and have wired hard to ensure that everyone in our community has a place to meet friends, relax, learn new skills or even get involved and help out. We have...

- Youth Engagement:
...partnered with Torfaen Youth to launch a new youth club, providing safe, fun activities for young people.
- Family & Play Sessions:
...worked with Torfaen Play to offer new much needed family sessions, play clubs, and ALN (Additional Learning Needs) respite.
- Community Meals:
...delivered free lunch clubs and breakfast clubs, helping tackle social isolation and food insecurity.
- Digital Support:
...offered free support to help residents improve their digital skills and access online services.
- Children's Hangouts:
...set up spaces for play and connection.
- Weekly Food Shares:
...organised food sharing events to reduce food waste and get surplus food into local homes.

Financial Support for Local Groups

Through our small schemes allowances we've provided financial support to help local groups continue their valuable work:
